

Globalization in the Ancient Times



The Silk Roads globalized our worlds millennia ago. Trade trickled from Han China in 2nd century BCE and ended only when the Europeans broke into the spice trade in the 15th century CE. The landed Silk Roads joined present-day China, Kazakhstan, Russia, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Azerbaijan, India, Iran, Afghanistan, Ukraine, and Belarus before meeting up with eastern, central, and western Europe. The maritime Silk Roads took in ports that straddled present-day Vietnam, Philippines, Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, India, Sri Lanka, Pakistan, Iran, and the Gulf Arab states, and continued on to Alexandria, Venice, Genoa, and Cadiz in the Mediterranean, after a short overland transit through the Arabian Peninsula.

Horticulture

HELLEBORES

any of us can remember a rather bedraggled, pitiful-looking little plant struggling up from the cluttered cold earth during the winter. It was called a "Christmas Rose", Helleborus niger. Anything less rose-like can hardly be imagined. Fortunately, we can now push that memory way into the back of our cranial attic and revel in the wondrous profusion of new cultivars over the past few years. In spite of the epithet "niger" meaning black, the flowers of the Christmas Rose are whitish pink.

It is not clear what led to this resurgence of interest among plant breeders. Possibly it was because, in the temperate zones, it is a plant that flourishes in the dead of winter when very few others are doing very much.

The genus Hellebore is endemic to the temperate regions of Eurasia. It is in the family of Ranunculaceae and is in no way connected to roses. There are twenty-two species. Some of them have very well-camouflaged petals in greeny brown shades. Many of them were described and named back in the late 18th century and early 19th century after Linnaeus gave the index species its name. A crucial point to keep in mind with all of them is that the plant's tissues are very poisonous. Even just handling the petals without gloves can lead to an uncomfortable rash.

Spontaneous hybridization often occurs but intentional crossing has increased the range of colors very significantly, making them useful for difficult places in the garden. More than one English nursery has contributed to this palate. In addition, the form of the blossom has been modified with double petals and picotee margins. Hellebores are pretty tolerant in the garden, doing quite well in the shade for example.

If any of you enjoy the early magnolia blossom in February, I can recommend visiting the SF Botanical Garden. The last time I was there the pink magnolia flowers were echoed by the pink hellebore flowers planted under the trees. It was heavenly.
