Remembering Past SFGC President Mary Chicos by Betty Voris



Even if you didn't see her, you heard her entourage entering the room. Mary Chicos never attended a Garden Club event or luncheon that she didn't bring at least one friend, often enough to fill a table. Mary's enthusiasm was infectious. Her laugh identifiable. A 42-year member of the Garden Club, she served as president in 1990. She was a generous donor to club projects and often honored its president with a donation to a special club fund. But it was her spirit and her energy that drew club members to her at meetings. If you sat with Mary and her guests, you were in for a wonderful few hours.

Her tenure not only had a theme, it drew SF Chronicle publicity. "A sweep at the switch" was the Club's project. Every month members would go to the cable car turnaround at the foot of Powell Street

and literally sweep the streets. With brooms, scoops and trash bags supplied by the Dept. of Public Works, members brought their gloves and energy. Each month on a Tuesday, Mary and crew would don gloves, pick up the brooms and follow through on their goal to "Let's make the area sparkle." Mary's stories from those days kept listeners rapt with laughter. For her dedication, Mary was given a Lifetime Achievement Award from the club.

At 19 Mary came to the United States from Greece and immediately enrolled at CCSF. She met Sam at a Greek dance. They were married 63 years and built

Chicos Market on Nob Hill, their family business that she helped Sam make a success. She was a mother to one son and two daughters, grandmother to two and great-grandmother to one. Mary was happy she lived long enough to witness the election of her niece, Eleni Kounalakis, as Lt. Governor of CA.

During the last year, Mary was unable to attend meetings. She died on March 30th at the age of 88 and left a legacy with the Garden Club that will be hard to follow. Rest in Peace, Mary. It is well-deserved.

Lotusland Trip

A Trip to the Gardens of Montecito and Santa Barbara

On April 22, a band of San Francisco Garden Club members and guests met at the Montecito Inn to begin a four day field trip touring two exceptional gardens, a beautifully restored historical mansion, plus delicious restaurants and fabulous shops

along the way.

Organized by our President, Bonnie Demergasso, every detail was well thought out and did not disappoint! The Montecito Inn was a lovely central point with a warm European feel and a very convenient and good restaurant on site for our breakfasts and dinners, for those who chose to dine in.

First up for tour was the Bellosguardo Mansion. Once part of the Huguette Clark Family Estate, was bequeathed to the Bellosguardo Foundation with the goal of transforming it into a focal point for art and culture in Santa Barbara and beyond. The house is a repository for the priceless art and antiques collected by the "copper king" and Senator William Andrews Clark. The private tour was led by former SF art gallerist and historian now a native Santa Barbara, Thomas Reynolds.



The garden focal point of our visit was Lotusland, the famed collection of exotic gardens owned by Madame Ganna Walska and opened to the public in 1937. A passionate gardening visionary and generous humanitarian, Ganna Walska created dramatic "rooms" of outdoor tropical and subtropical fantasies. In time, she added many examples of gardening styles to please the eye. Led by a very knowledgeable docent, we were delighted at every turn.

The next garden we visited was located high on the hills of the Santa Ynez range above Santa Barbara and Montecito. The Santa Barbara Botanical Garden was founded in 1926 with a commitment to California native plants. The garden

was originally laid out in various plant communities, such as chaparral, desert and prairie with emphasis on plants from the Pacific slope of North America, including the small islands hugging the central and southern California coast. Now as you explore, the layout is more natural, just as if you were hiking through various trails in our national parks and public gardens

We were most fortunate to have a lively docent who was passionate about the garden and at 89 years old was a font of historical and horticultural information, shared with gusto and good sense! She guided us along garden paths bursting with Spring growth on either side, through meadows carpeted with wildflowers and to vistas that looked out to hills covered in varied species of native oaks and forests of evergreen trees. At the end of one West facing trail, we could see the Channel islands from afar and looking around us, see the flora gathered and growing from those islands.

In between the educational attractions, we indulged the call of the many fine restaurants and shops, plus other historical buildings in Santa Barbara, Montecito and in Summerland, a beach enclave located just below Montecito.

We left this wonderful field trip with the enthusiastic idea to come back individually to savor again what we had enjoyed together as a group. Thank you Bonnie for a wonderful experience!











The Light Eaters

by Zoë Schlanger



Award-winning Atlantic staff writer Zoë Schlanger delivers a groundbreaking work of popular science that probes the hidden world of the plant kingdom and reveals the astonishing capabilities of the green life all around us.

Let there be light indeed. Without it there would be no plants, no animals, no us. Although the unique capacity of plants for photosyntheis has long fascinated biologists, It was assumed that plants were, stupid, Not any more. In "The Light Eaters," Zoë Schlanager, a science journalist, sheds light on how these previously underestimated creatures have been enjoying their newfound place in the scientific sun. To read "The Light Eaters" is to be astounded by the complex behaviors of the ostensibly lower life forms.

The Light Eaters is a deep immersion into the drama of green life and the complexity of this wild and awe-inspiring world that challenges our very understanding of agency, consciousness, and intelligence. In looking closely, we see that plants, rather than imitate human intelligence, have perhaps formed a

parallel system. What is intelligent life if not a vine that grows leaves to blend into the shrub on which it climbs, a flower that shapes its bloom to fit exactly the beak of its pollinator, a pea seedling that can hear water flowing and make its way toward it? Zoë Schlanger takes us across the globe, digging into her own memories and into the soil with the scientists who have spent their waking days studying these amazing entities up close.

What can we learn about life on Earth from the living things that thrive, adapt, consume, and accommodate simultaneously? More important, what do we owe these life forms once we come to understand their rich and varied abilities? Examining the latest epiphanies in botanical research, Schlanger spotlights the intellectual struggles among the researchers conceiving a wholly new view of their subject, offering a glimpse of a field in turmoil as plant scientists debate the tenets of ongoing discoveries and how they influence our understanding of what a plant is.

We need plants to survive. But what do they need us for—if at all? An eye-opening and informative look at the ecosystem we live in, this book challenges us to rethink the role of plants—and our own place—in the natural world. Find it on <u>Amazon.com</u> or your bookstore.


Outside In: A year of growing and displaying


LUNCHEON ON NOVEMBER 14th FEATURING ENTERTAINER

Joe Gold String Orchestra. Favors will be provided by Lush and See's Candy as well as floral arrangements by Pinion Design Inc.

Gatti, event planner extraordinaire who enjoys a reputation unmatched in the Bay Area, is one of just a handful around the world who has revolutionized the vision, form and function that tailor today's A-list events. He has been a household name in San Francisco for many years, designing for cultural and

social events as well as weddings and high-end restaurants. He specializes in creating a visual ambiance for events from

intimate gatherings to corporate conferences and red carpet soirces. His services run the gamut of event design - from floral and theatrical lighting to table settings, linens and party favors. Servving on the San Francisco Arts Commission for nine years he's been appointed its president 1996.

Stanlee splits his time between San Francisco and Los Angeles, where he designs some of the most high-profile events in Hollywood. For example, he designed Sir Elton John's In-Style post-Oscar party in 2003 and the In-Style post-Oscar event in 2004. He designed

Hubert Keller's Fleur de Lys restaurant in Las Vegas's Mandalay Bay Hotel including all glassware, silverware and plates. For many years he has designed the patron's dinner tent for the opening of the San Francisco Symphony and the patrons tent for Black and White Ball. He has designed events for the San Francisco Opera, San Francisco Ballet, SF MOMA, Asian Art Museum, de Young Museum, and The Center for the Arts.

At the Fairmont Hotel he styled a luncheon honoring former Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev, and his work was seen on "The Oprah Winfrey Show." He has designed more that 100 events for San Francisco Chief of Protocol Charlotte Mailliard.

Twenty five years ago, Stanlee began his career as a florist at

the St. Francis Hotel Flower Shop in San Francisco. He was quickly promoted to hospitality manager for the hotel, a position created specially for him. He remained at the Hotel until 1987, when he departed to establish Stanlee R. Gatti Designs, Stanlee was born and raised in Raton, New Mexico.
