## Program: 100th Anniversary of the Legion of Honor and history of the Legion of Honor



Before joining the 2011 docent class of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco, Virginia Ernster spent her career as an epidemiologist on the faculty of the UCSF School of Medicine, where she served as Chair of the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics and Associate Director of UCSF's Comprehensive Cancer Center. She conducted research on cancer risk factors and screening and for many years directed a course in the medical school's core curriculum. She was also a member of the Board of Scientific Advisors of the National Cancer Institute and received the U.S. Surgeon General's Medallion for her work as Senior Scientific Editor of the Surgeon General's report on Women and Smoking.

Virginia finds that being a docent has much in common with academic life: always learning new things, sharing that knowledge with others, and growing through interaction with the multiple rich points of view brought to the museums by visitors from near and far.

An Ikebana Journey

Originating from Buddhist flower offerings in the 6th century, the exotic world of Ikebana has continually charmed viewers worldwide. ONE WORLD: TWO VOICES previews its journey via the talents of acclaimed Ikebana authorities Mitsuko Suiko Maruyama and Ron Kodo Brown. Misao Osumi, wife of the Consul General of Japan, is responsible for creating this event's concept and presentation.

From the traditional style of Ohara to the more avant-garde school of Sogetsu, Mitsuko Suiko Maruyama and Ron Kodo Brown will showcase the beauty and scope of each discipline. Mitsuko, a celebrated teacher of Oharo, and Ron, a highly recognized expert of Sogetsu, together will explain both history and technique as they alternate creating three arrangements each. In a dramatic climax, a design created by each will be combined into one magnificent finale.

The charm and culture of Ikebana is freedom of expression. The Ohara School of Ikebana, which emphasizes the beauty of natural environments was founded in 1895 when Japan began to import European flowers. The Sogetsu school was founded in 1927 and celebrates being an open-minded and avant-garde school.

Although Mitsuko and Ron have been friends for decades, neither have presented together. "This is going to be exciting," exclaimed Ron.

ONE WORLD: TWO VOICES, An Ikebana Journey is a return by the San Francisco Garden Club to its annual event which raises funds for its scholarship, community and philanthropic projects. It kicks off SFGC's year-long celebration leading up to its 100° Anniversary in 2026.

A three-course luncheon will follow the morning presentation. The main course is Grilled Sea Bass with VerJus Beurre Blanc with Tomato Sauce; please note with your reservation if you prefer a vecetarian alternative.

























## Horticulture

## Development of the Gladiolus

he modern mature gladiolus is a tough looking customer as befitting a plant whose name is derived from the Latin for sword. Carl Linnaeus coined the name in Species Plantarum. Six or more sturdy blossoms march down the tall strong stem in perfect order. Look at them in your local supermarket or florist's. They stand up straight in those nondescript buckets as if they own the place. They come in numerous colors from white to deep purple though never in blue. Then take a look at a slightly fragile looking species gladiolus and compare the two. How did this enormous change occur?

Gladiolus has a fairly wide distribution in Mediterranean Europe, Asia and tropical Africa but the center of diversity is the Cape Province in South Africa. Of the approximately 260 species 10 are European and Asian. All the rest are African.

The nomenclature has undergone numerous revisions. Readers are advised to take a deep breath as they go through the next section. The beautiful modern hybrids which we can buy so easily nowadays have many antecedents and yet really only about a dozen of the available species have been intensively crossed. In the past few years breeders have begun looking into intergeneric crosses to breed in new desirable traits.

One European species, Gladiolus communis Mill, was recorded as early as 1575. Gerard mentioned it in his Herbal in 1597. Another species, G. byzantinus, was mentioned by John Parkinson in 1629. G. byzantinus was called the Corn Flag of Constantinople in those days. It too has had a new name. This flower is now G. communis subsp. byzantinus (Mill.) You may now exhale.

Queen Victoria visited Fontainebleau in 1853 with Prince Albert and was enchanted by the flowers. The noted French horticulturist Eugene Souchet had cunningly distributed vases of them among his borders to draw the visitors' eye. The queen succumbed. She requested that some of these plants be sent to her gardeners at Osborne. Once she went home to London and everyone heard about her enthusiasm English nurserymen got busy vying for the royal patronage.

The flowers was taken up almost simultaneously by a number of very gifted and driven breeders in several countries. An outstanding Canadian, Henry Groff, teamed with an upstate New York coal merchant Arthur Cowee to sell his prize winning cultivars.



Quite early in this process a farmers wife in Ohio, Mrs A. H. Austin began to be obsessed with the plant. She very quietly got her husband to buy a lot of extra land and ran a business, selling more than one million corms in a year. She was also an official in American Gladiolus Society and wrote articles for their magazine for years. Very few women were able to run a buisnes on that scale in the late 19th century. It took me a long time to find out that her given name was Iva.

## Bouquets to Art

## Bouquets to Art • June 2-8, 2025

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ouquets to Art was born from an idea presented to the Museum Society Auxiliary by Ian McKibben White, who was then the director of the Fine Arts Museums. In 1985 Bouquets to Art made its debut at the M. H. de Young Memorial Museum.

When it began, Bouquets to Art was a small affair, with 46 floral displays celebrating the Fine Arts Museums' collections. Lectures and demonstrations were presented by well known Bay Area designers. The event drew hundreds of new visitors to the museum and the annual event was assured.

Since 1985, the event has been housed in three different museums: the M. H. de Young Memorial Museum, the Legion of Honor and the de Young. The diverse styles of these buildings greatly influenced the floral displays

The original M. H. de Young Memorial Museum, founded in 1895, was damaged by the Loma Prieta earthquake of 1989. While the new building was under construction, Bouquets to Art moved to the then recently refurbished Beaux Arts style Legion of Honor where it continued to flourish. The newly constructed de Young Museum designed by Herzog & de Meuron opened in 2005. In 2006, Bouquets to Art was transferred to the new building.

Bouquets to Art, a week-long event produced by the Fine Arts Museums Auxiliary, now includes: a beautiful opening night gala, an enticing week-long raffle, 2-4 lectures presented by prominent designers in the floral industry, Floral Fashions (creations by SF City College Floral Design students), and gorgeous floral arrangements that reflect the art displayed in the Museums. In 2025, exhibitors will be offered choices from 100 pieces of art. There will be 75 art choices at the de Young and 25 at the Legion of Honor. A special floral installation by a designer will be at the Legion of Honor to celebrate the return of Bouquets to Art.

Seven students supervised by Steven Brown, Chair of the Environmental Horticulture and Floral Design Department at SF City College will create the Floral Fashions for Bouquets to Arts. Floral Fashions will be on display in the Piazzoni Murals Room at the de Young Museum throughout the week. Eva Monroe, Jane Bradford Evans, Maureen Fox and Verona Boucher will represent the San Francisco Garden Club at the Legion of Honor.

Over the years proceeds from Bouquets to Art have funded special/major exhibitions, art acquisitions educational programs, and projects of the Museums. In 2025, Bouquets to Art will be held June 2-8.








order to observe and record our impressions of the garden.

## Civic Participation

## SFGC APPROVES CIVIC PARTICIPATION RECOMMENDATION OF UPGRADE TO CITY COLLEGE'S HORTICULTURE DEPARTMENT

SFGC will invest \$25,000 in assisting with the refurbishment of Horticulture Programs at City College of San Francisco. The Board of Directors voted to accept the recommendation of the Civic Participation Committee at its February meeting.

With the donation, the club will supply materials for City College's Horticultural Department to rebuild its Student Greenhouse, construct a Formal Reading Garden and provide furniture and equipment for its Floristry Program Library.

According to department head Steven Brown, the students will benefit immeasurably from the upgraded greenhouse systems to its 30-year-old greenhouse/laboratory that the donation will provide. Students will rebuild the greenhouse using equipment and materials paid for with our grant.

The Formal Reading Garden will be a neat garden, carefully planned in a geometric and symmetric manner. The formal garden will have box-trimmed hedges lining or enclosing carefully laid out flowerbeds or garden beds and include pathways, staturary and a stately fountain. It will be available for use by both college and non-college students. While labor will be supplied by the students, the SFGC will supply the materials needed for completion.

In addition, shelf units and a copier for instructional use are needed to develop and update the Horticulture and Floral Design library to make it more accessible for students. Not only will SFGC purchase these for the department, but SFGC Librarian Judith Taylor has offered to help them organize and manage it.

Civic Participation Chair Ann Arnold is excited that the club will be involved in such a major way with City College. "They are such an integral part of what we do - both in programs and through the Alice Eastwood Scholarships, and this will help their program to achieve new heights," she commented.
